

Common Core State Standards for Mathematics

Kindergarten students will focus on objectives in the following areas:

✓ Counting and Cardinality

counting to 100 by 1s and 10s, write #s to 20, greater than, less than

√ Geometry

shapes (2-D and 3-D), positional words, building and drawing 2-D shapes

✓ Measurement and Data

length, weight, height, sorting objects into categories

Number and Operations (base ten)

Make or break apart numbers from 11 to 19 into one ten and some ones and record with an equation (e.g., 18 = 10 + 8)

✓ Operations and Algebraic Thinking

Addition, subtraction, decomposing numbers, find the number that makes 10 (e.g. If you have 6, what number is needed to make 10?)

Common Core State Standards for Mathematics

Students are taught in small groups to help each child reach and/or exceed the end of year objectives.

Our program also works towards developing problem solving skills and the ability to verbalize mathematical thinking.

 A balanced program that includes reading, writing, listening, and speaking standards as outlined by Common Core State Standards.


We utilize:

- Guided reading
- Writing (Writing Framework, daily journals, poetry journals, interactive and shared writing)
- Phonemic awareness games/activities
- High frequency words (sight words)
- Phonics
- Read Alouds



What Is Guided Reading?

- Small, flexible groups meet with the teacher daily
- Lessons are based on the developmental progression of reading behaviors. This includes comprehension, fluency, and decoding.
- Student progress is determined using formal and informal assessments.



Writing in Kindergarten

Developmental (scribbling, drawing, letter-like forms, letter strings, invented spelling, conventional spelling)

Daily (journals, shared and interactive writing)




CLASSROOM SNACK
